United Voice is a self-advocacy society of persons with learning disabilities.

Currently in view of the Covid lockdowns, all the Self-Advocacy trainings and Social Skill Transition trainings are now conducted online. 80% of our employment project members are working from home doing weaving or sewing.

We managed to launch our small cafe in March this year. Business has been slow after the 1st month but we are doing a lot more promotions on both cafe and bakery and introducing new products like the UV signature cheese tartlets; lemon, chocolate and butter cake loaves; a variety of seasonal pastries, almond thins, and other goodies.

Stories Around The Region

"What if you were running a development organization, and your target audience included people from dozens of different language groups? How would you help them? That's a question our ministry is trying to address."

For the past 3 years, I (Karl) have been putting together and directing a collaborative assessment project in Island Southeast Asia trying to figure out where the most urgent needs are for translation of the Good Book. 16 people are involved full-time from various countries.

Before the pandemic, we were in full swing, traveling and updating strategic information for various organizations. Since the pandemic, we have shifted gears and focused more on training and doing some things online.



Now we are finally able to start some field activities again and have hired 4 new people.

We are thankful that:

- We continue to clarify where translation is most needed, and translation agencies are responding by sending people to meet the need!
- We have been able to recruit some new people to help with the increased demand for our help.
- We have been able to collaborate more closely with key local partners, which increases our effectiveness.

We ask for wisdom and provision in the following areas:

- Organizations have been active in translation in the country for the past 50 years. During that time, most of the "low-hanging fruit", the easy projects, have been finished. What remains are the really difficult projects. May we and others have wisdom to know how to approach these projects.
- We just found out that our sole funder will not be continuing our project funding after June. We are in shock. May Jehovah Jireh provide what we need to help others well.
- One of our biggest priorities is partnership and collaboration. That can be difficult as people/organizations have different focuses. We need wisdom in how to serve others well within our competencies. This has definitely improved over the past year (2020) but needs continual attention.
- That the project team members, especially the new ones, would be encouraged and strengthened in their desire to serve those who do not yet have the Word in a language they understand well.

# Interserve



How A SEED Grew To Impact The World

Interserve Malaysia

1800

In the 1800s, women in India had no status, no education and no access to basic health care. The poorest of them were confined to the zenanas (closed quarters), neglected and forgotten. It was this that gave birth to Interserve.

One day, a wealthy Indian woman who was literate, found a copy of a Bible. As she reads it, she was so convicted that she desired to be baptised. Word of this reached an English merchant's wife, living in India at that time. In response, she quoted, "If we can give them the power to read and the Book to read. God will bless His word".

She wasted no time and wrote to Mary Jane Kinnaird (founder of YWCA) in the United Kingdom. She requested funds to train women teachers who would then be sent out to these zenanas to teach the Indian women to read and write and empower them to think. The Calcutta Normal School was founded in 1852 for this purpose. In just 15 years since, 72 zenanas opened their doors to these pioneer teachers. While teaching the women in the zenanas, these teachers realized the necessity for women doctors to attend to their healthcare needs.

In India in the 1800s, there was not a single woman doctor. Male doctors were not permitted into the zenanas regardless of the gravity and urgency for medical attention. Again, an appeal was sent to England, urging British universities to train women doctors who can be sent to the zenanas in India. That commenced the medical mission work of Interserve. English women doctors were trained and deployed to India. Interserve was then christened Zenana Bible and Medical Mission (ZRMM)




Beginning in the 1960s, following a road trip around the subcontinent, the National Director of Interserve India then felt a strong conviction that the way forward for mission work in the nation needed to evolve. Full ownership of all hospitals, schools and orphanages was entrusted over to our Indian partners. Yet another ground breaking move for its time.

True to the beliefs and principles of our founding women, today we partner with individuals to support them in their own profession to transform lives and communities through encounter with Jesus Christ.

Our fellowship today includes teachers, engineers, accountants, agriculturist, graphic designers. We hold firm to the belief that all and any gifting and profession can be used for the glory of God. In these present times, we have partners who engage with issues of the day - migrant crisis, human trafficking, extreme poverty, climate care and equipping indigenous Christians for cross-cultural discipling.

With 14 sending bases, over 800 partners in over 40 countries, we pray the Spirit of God will continue to move in and through us for His glory and purpose. 14 Sending Bases


